RE: Wendy Hall: Re: Grand Challenges for Computing Research

I'm away till the end of the week now, so here is my initial reply.

I was not invited to address the foresight conference.

My impression of Foresight is that it is complementary to a Grand Challenge initiative. It is more realistic in starting with the current state of the art, and planning out the next steps against a five year horizon. It is more inclusive, in that it follows the pattern of a call for proposals that might appeal to a large percentage of the research community.

A Grand Challenge attempts to take a longer term view, and accepts that it will attract only a small proportion of the research community to actually work on it. In many research areas (eg., statistics, and probably most of Computer Science), Grand Challenges are simply not appropriate.

I think our moderators mostly realise this, and they have produced drafts that look more like surveys of the field and calls for proposals on the Foresight model. I therefore think it would be an excellent idea to move most of our GC initiative back into the more familiar fold of 'Next steps' and calls for proposals, and 'Research Clusters'. Then any Grand Challenges that emerge from the exercise can be seen as just part of the picture, and we don't have to be comprehensive as we have tried to be at times.

Perhaps you could consider this as the germ of an idea for a practical recommendation to the UKCRC on 26 May. Then we would circulate it to our PC.

Dear Robin and Tony

I was tasked by the UKCRC exec to liaise with you about the way UKCRC and yourselves want to take the Grand Challenges forward.

I have a couple of points of information that you might want to take into account while considering this

1. Foresight Cognitive Systems. Nigel Shadbolt and I have been heavily

involved with this and are co-authors with Keith van R of one of the reports that was used as the basis for initial discussions (on Memory, Reasoning and Learning). I understand that you have been invited to address the next Cog Systems workshop on May 14 about the UKCRC Grand Challenges work. I'm just trying to square the circle here, so that you know that there is some considerable overlap between the two initiatives already. They (Foresight) are keen on the Grand Challenges idea so I think we can say that UKCRC has had some influence here, but Nigel and I feel that they are watering the idea down somewhat (so the challenges they are coming up with are far from grand!) and we might want to encourage them to raise their game on this a little!

2. I don't know if you know that I'm President of the BCS next year, and I'm talking to CPHC and UKCRC about organising a BCS/IEE sponsored conference co-located with the CPHC conference next year (~April 2004) to enable the CS community to discuss the "Future of Computer Science Research and Teaching". If this goes ahead (we are still waiting for CPHC to confirm where and when their conference will be held next year and confirm collaboration on the two conferences), then it would seem sensible to hold a Grand Challenges workshop(s) as part of the conference. Does this sound sensible?
